**Tulsa Race Massacre: 100 Years Later**

Home to the successful and historic Black Wall Street, the Greenwood District lost over 300 citizens to the Tulsa Race Massacre of 1921. The tragedy was kept a secret for 75 years. Greenwood continues to suffer from redlining policies and the construction of a highway which perpetuated the destruction of the community. This documentary blends historical accounts of the massacre and the art of local creatives to paint a full picture of Greenwood- from the past, present and aspirations of a thriving future.

**2 / 14 at 9:30pm**

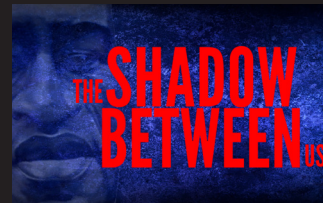

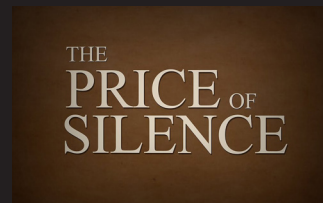

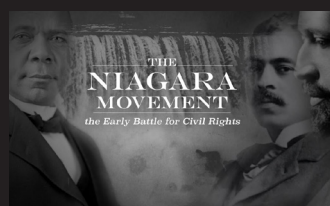
The filmmakers explore the Lost Souls Project, which is working to remember and identify African Americans who were forcibly removed from New Jersey and taken to Louisiana.

**Niagara Movement: The Early Battle for Civil Rights**

Documentary focused on the formation and impact of the first civil rights movement of the 20th century. 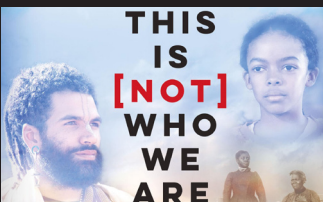

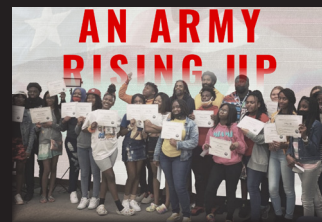

**Truth Tellers**

For more than 20 years, artist and activist Robert Shetterly has painted a collection of more than 250 portraits entitled "Americans Who Tell the Truth." From contemporary activists for racial justice such as Zyahna Bryant and Rev. Lennox Yearwood to climate activists like Bill McKibben and Kelsey Juliana to great civil rights leaders like John Lewis and Fannie Lou Hamer, Shetterly has captured great Americans and etched their inspiring quotes into the backgrounds of each painting.
