Education

Redlands has excellent educational facilities, including the University of Redlands, one of the nation's leading private universities; Redlands Unified School District has four high schools (including one alternative HS); four middle schools; and sixteen elementary schools serving over 21,000 students. There are also more than 15 top-rated private and public colleges/universities within a 45-minute drive.

Recreation

Redlands residents and visitors have a variety of cultural and recreational amenities to choose from including a vibrant historic downtown; challenging 18-hole golf course; four performing arts theaters/amphitheaters; six museums; a family-friendly water park; nature preserve; 21 city parks; a 36-acre sports complex; nearly 30 miles of hiking and equestrian trails; and over 36 miles of Class I, II and III bicycle paths.

Public Safety

The City of Redlands Police Department employs over 80 sworn officers and approximately 40 civilian personnel operating under a Risk Focused Policing (RFP) policy. The City of Redlands Fire Department maintains quality fire and emergency response services from its four strategically placed fire stations.
