A.K. SMILEY PUBLIC LIBRARY / LINCOLN SHRINE – 125 W. Vine Street

1898 - April 29. The A.K. Smiley Public Library * * is dedicated as a \$60,000 gift to the city by the Smiley Brothers.

1907 - Smiley Library Reference wing * is completed.

1920 - Daniel Smiley funds construction of the Children's wing of Smiley Library * that costs \$15,000. Opens in October.

1926 - December 1. The Lyon Wing of Smiley Library * * opens and constructed for \$31,000.

1932 - Lincoln Shrine * dedicated on February 12, 1932 was given by Robert and Alma Watchorn.

1934 - Lincoln Shrine Association * formed.

1936 - George Hinckley, city engineer, studies A. K. Smiley Library tower * and reports the tower must come down to follow Field Act of 1933. The tower was removed for \$516.

1937 - Lincoln Shrine * wings and wall addition and fountains are completed for \$12,000. The fountain wings of the Lincoln Shrine are designed by Herbert Powell.

1998 - February 12. Dedication of Lincoln Shrine * expansion.

ASISTENCIA MISSION – 26930 Barton Road

1928 - renovation begins by San Bernardino County Historical Society, Redlands Chamber of Commerce, and the State Emergency Relief Project.

1934 - The Contemporary Club helps build Panorama Point, Community Hospital *, and the restoration of the Asistencia.

1935 - WPA funds restoration of Asistencia with Horace Hinckley as field engineer.

1938 - WPA project to rebuild the Asistencia is completed with a bell tower. Horace Hinckley, civil engineer, is in charge.

1948 - Mr. and Mrs. Hugh McCulloch donate their 1856 Cuban sugar plantation bell to the Asistencia in Redlands that now resides in the courtyard.

BURRAGE MANSION – 1205 W. Crescent Avenue

1900 - Alfred Burrage of Boston purchases land * on the heights near Gertrude Bowers home to build palatial home on Crescent Avenue.

1901 - January. Burrage Mansion * is completed.

DOWNTOWN AREA (with explanation of types of events held there)

Lincoln Pilgrimage – Boy Scout event with Civil War reenactments taking place at the Lincoln Shrine.

Run Through Redlands – Fundraiser for Kiwanis Club to provide scholarships to graduating seniors in Redlands high schools.

Downtown Redlands Artwalk – Art event taking place on State Street.

Redlands Bicycle Classic – Bicycle race which takes place on downtown roads and Sunset Drive.

ED HALES PARK – E. State Street & N. 5th Street

1972 - The Guy Chandler building on East State and Fifth Street is torn down and becomes Ed Hales Park. (Atwood Block dates from 1903) The Western Star Soap and Redlands Bakery sign become part of Ed Hales Park.

1983 - Edwin R. Hales, City Planning Commissioner for 36 years, dies and is remembered in the downtown park on Fifth and E. State.

FOOTLIGHTERS THEATRE – 1810 Barton Road

FORD PARK PONDS – Parkford Drive & Marshall Street

1966 - June 3. Ford Park was officially opened on 25.75 acres with Rotary Club planting fish in the ponds.

KIMBERLY CREST – 1325 Prospect Drive

1897 - The Henry Fisher mansion * * of West Highland and San Mateo and the Cornelia Hill mansion * (Kimberly Crest) are built by Davis Donald.

1979 - Mary Kimberly Shirk dies but leaves her home to the Kimberly-Shirk Association.

1981 - Kimberly Crest House and Gardens * opens on Prospect Drive.

MOREY MANSION – 190 Terracina Boulevard

1890 - David Morey home * and Theodore Clark home both built for \$20,000.

MUSEUM OF REDLANDS – 700 Brookside Avenue

PROSPECT PARK CARRIAGE HOUSE – 1352 Prospect Drive

1953 - Park Commission formed by the city and attempted to buy Prospect Park in 1954.

1962 - The movement to Save Prospect Park begins again.

1963 - Bond Election for Prospect Park purchase is held on October 22. Redlanders voted the measure down by 55%.

1968 - Citizens save Prospect Park led by Helen Fisk, Mary Shirk, Alice Sewall and thousands of contributions matched by the Federal Government Federal Housing and Urban Development \$212,019.37. Prospect Park book is published containing Redlands history by Citrograph Print Shop.

1972 - Redlands Theater Festival is founded by Cliff Cabanilla, opening the Alice Meeker Sewall Theater with 400 seats in Prospect Park.

1996 - Jane Hillsen completes renovation of the Prospect Park Carriage House.

REDLANDS BOWL – Grant Street & Glenwood Drive

1915 - June 4. The city amphitheater * is dedicated to appreciate concerts and other productions.

1921 - Redlands Amphitheatre * _ * moves municipal band shell closer to the public for improved acoustics.

1930 - Prosellis is given to Redlands Bowl *. Clarence and Florence White spend \$35,000 secretly to present their gift. Herbert Powell is the architect.

REDLANDS COUNTY CLUB – 1749 Garden Street

1896 - Redlands Country Club is established and is now the second oldest county club in Southern California.

1897 - Redlands Country Club * _ begins operation with twenty-five men, 80 acres, club-house and greens sanded and oiled.

1927 - Redlands Country Club is finally completed as an 18-hole golf course.

1961 - Country Club clubhouse rebuilt after the 1948 fire burns down.

REDLANDS GLASS MUSEUM – 1157 N. Orange Street

1985 - Redlands Historical Glass Museum at 1157 N. Orange Street opens.

SEWALL THEATRE – 1352 Prospect Drive

1972 - Redlands Theater Festival is founded by Cliff Cabanilla, opening the Alice Meeker Sewall Theater with 400 seats in Prospect Park.

SYLVAN PARK – 525 N. University Avenue

1909 - A committee is formed for the purchasing of land for Sylvan Park * _ \$50,000

1911 - Bond issue for new City Park passes (Sylvan Park) City creates Park Commission.

1912 - Sylvan Park * _ is dedicated. The Pinetum section of Sylvan Park opens for overnight camping for migrant labor and Rim of the World mountain travelers.

1919 - Sylvan Park * _ has camping area for travelers going into the mountains on the west end.

1920 - Discrimination in Redlands was widespread with real estate red-lining, Sylvan Park swimming pool, Fox Theater to name only a few race policies.

1921 - George Hinckley, City Engineer, announces a Sylvan Plunge bond would cost \$20,000. Redlands' youth have a parade July 8 to promote the plunge. The bond fails by 22 votes.

1921 - Pacific Electric to run a bus from Orange and Citrus to the University of Redlands * _ and Sylvan Park every half hour beginning at 6:45 a.m. every half hour.

1922 - September 14. Fund raising events for the Sylvan Plunge. November 11. Armistice Day and work begins on Sylvan Plunge * _.

1923 - June 22. Redlands Lawn Bowling Club * begins in Sylvan Park next to the plunge.

1923 - Sylvan Plunge * * opens June 16, 1923 with water provided by the Mill Creek Zanja pipeline beginning under the University Street bridge.

1926 - Lawn Bowling Club builds facilities in Sylvan Park.

1930 - Sylvan Plunge * closed due to Infantile Paralysis.

1982 - Curtis Allen forms Redlands Fourth of July Band with first concert in Sylvan Park on the 4th of July.

UNIVERSITY OF REDLANDS BOWL, ALUMNI HOUSE, ETC. – 1200 E. Colton Avenue

1907 - University of Redlands * is founded as a Baptist College under the leadership of Jasper Newton Field. First Zanja Fiesta is held at the University.

1909 - University of Redlands Administration * Greek Revival building is completed and classes begin September 29.

1910 - June. University of Redlands * holds first Zanja Festival with a musical program.

1911 - October 26. The University of Redlands Air Show * opens with the Bleroit monoplane featured. Great balloon ascension October 27-29 takes place during aviation week.

1913 - Temperance rally held to warn against the evils of alcohol. Special concern for the University of Redlands * and the Casa Loma Hotel *.

1920 - Retaining wall * along University Street from Colton to Sylvan is built to help support new University of Redlands science building.

1921 - Zanja Fiesta * * held at the Alumni stage at University of Redlands. 2,000 people attend this 12th annual fiesta. The Alumni stage was the first part of the University's Greek Theatre to be completed.

1927 - University of Redlands Memorial Chapel * is designed by Herbert Powell, previous RHS grad and U of R graduate. Construction begins on the \$160,000 building with a \$40,000 Casavant organ.

1927 - Alumni Greek Theatre * is built at the University of Redlands with seating for graduation.

1928 - February 19. University of Redlands Memorial Chapel * is dedicated with dedication led by Jasper Newton Field, first President of the University. Four months later Currier Gymnasium is completed.

1940 - April 5. Eleanor Roosevelt visits Redlands and speaks at the University of Redlands *.

1949 - Los Angeles Rams * use the University of Redlands campus as training facility and remains here until 1960.

1964 - February 27. Folk singer Joan Baez returns to Redlands and performs at the [Clock Auditorium](#) * and the University of Redlands Chapel to overflow crowds.

1968 - A lease-purchase agreement allows for the building of a new [Football Stadium](#) at the University of Redlands on Brockton Avenue. The University, the city and school district join forces to accomplish the construction.

1982 - Cheers TV show is inspired by Gay 90's Pizza ideas from creators Glen Charles and Les Charles, alumni of the University of Redlands.

1988 - April 15. Former President Jimmy Carter is Convocation speaker at the [U of R Orton Center](#).
