A. UNIVERSITY OF REDLANDS, APPLICANT (PROJECT PLANNER: JOCELYN TORRES)

PUBLIC HEARING to consider **Demolition No. 359** – A request to demolish an existing detached garage over 50 years of age located within the University of Redlands campus. The existing garage is located approximately 550 feet south of E. Colton Avenue and approximately 86 feet west of N.

Grove Street in the Educational District (APN: 0170-092-01-0000). This

project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15301 (Existing Facilities) of the CEQA Guidelines.

Vice Chairman Holm opened the Public Hearing.

Ms. Jocelyn Torres, Assistant Planner, gave an overview and presentation on the Demolition.

The Commission had no comments or concerns on Demolition No. 359.

Vice Chairman Holm closed the Public Hearing.

It was moved by Commissioner Gonzales and seconded by Commissioner Rose-Marie Raumin and carried a vote of 5-0 (Chair Heidelberg and Commissioner Weissman absent) that the Historic and Scenic Preservation Commission adopt Resolution No. 2021-12, determining that Demolition Permit No. 359 was exempt from review under the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to Section 15301 of the CEQA Guidelines and approved Demolition Permit No. 359, based on the facts within the staff report and subject to the Conditions of Approval.

B. MASONIC TEMPLE ASSOCIATION OF REDLANDS, INC., APPLICANT

PUBLIC HEARING to consider Historic Resource Designation No. 137 – A request to consider a recommendation to the City Council for a nomination for designation as a Local Historic Resource of a two-story brick building utilized as the Redlands Masonic Lodge located at 131 Cajon Street (APN: 0171-301-02-0000). This application is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15061(b)(3) of the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines.

Vice Chairman Holm opened the Public Hearing.

Ms. Loralee Farris, Principal Planner, gave an overview and presentation on the Historic Designation.

Commissioner Bricker inquired if the applicant considered designating the property at a higher level. Mr. Josh Le Vesque stated there are issues with the property and there is a dispute with their neighbors, the church and the lodge had an easement for approximately ninety (90) years that allowed a fire exit on the easement. The church has been in construction and has revoked the easement. The lodge is trying to utilize the historic regulations to move the fire escape to the east side of the building. Commissioner Bricker recommended at a later date to pursue a landmark designation and apply for the property to be listed on the national register and suggested identifying some of the key interior spaces, it may give the lodge added benefits. Ms. Farris stated the designation will allow the applicant to use the historic building code and provide them additional flexibility in their exiting requirements. Commissioner Bricker inquired if the change in the designation will affect the photography business that rents space in the lodge. Mr. Josh Le Vesque stated

the entire first floor is occupied by tenant's that are not related to the lodge, and confirmed there are no impacts to the tenants.

Commissioner Gonzales thanked the applicant for removing the front awning on the lodge.

Vice Chairman Holm closed the Public Hearing.

It was moved by Commissioner Gonzales and seconded by Commissioner Raumin and carried on a vote of 5-0 (Chair Heidelberg and Commissioner Weissman absent) that the HSPC moved to adopt Resolution No. 2021-13, determining that the designation of a historic resource was exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15061(b)(3) (General Rule), and to nominate and recommend that the City Council designate the Redlands Masonic Lodge located at 131 Cajon Street to be eligible to become a Historic Resource in accordance with Chapter 2.62 of the Redlands Municipal Code.

- V. NEW BUSINESS
 - 1. PROPERTY ONE, LLC, APPLICANT (PROJECT PLANNER: EMILY ELLIOTT)

PUBLIC HEARING to consider **Certificate of Appropriateness No. 638** to rehabilitate the historic Old Chambers of Commerce building (Historic Landmark No. 40) located at 347 Orange Street. Rehabilitation work includes the construction of a 182 square foot freestanding restroom building; the creation of a new brick plaza; a new outdoor patio area, surrounded by moveable planters and covered by a retractable fabric awning; a new walk-up service window and entry door on the north side of the building; and rehabilitation to the exterior façade and roof. This project is exempt from environmental review pursuant to Section 15331 (Historical Resource Restoration/Rehabilitation) of the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines.

Chairman Kurt Heidelberg opened the Public Hearing.

Ms. Emily Elliott, Contract Planner, gave an overview and presentation on the proposal.

Mr. Glenn Fearon, Property One, LLC representative, came forward and stated he was available for any questions from the Commission.

Commissioner Rose-Marie Raumin inquired if they are keeping the pillars outside, to match the Santa Fe Depot style. Mr. Fearon confirmed that they were.

Commissioner Greg Weissman inquired about the thought process behind making the restrooms a stand-alone building and whether security measures had been considered regarding the freestanding nature of the restroom building. Mr. Fearon indicated that the restroom structure will be unified to the existing building through the outdoor dining area for the tenant, that the free-standing nature of the structure eliminates further modification to the original historic building, and that the property owner employs a security guard for properties they own downtown, who makes several passes at night n the area, twenty four (24) hours a day, seven (7) days a week.

Commissioner Weismann asked if there are any other public freestanding restrooms in the downtown area besides the parks. Mr. Fearon indicated he was not immediately aware of any similar examples.

Commissioner Lauren Bricker commended the project, and said she does like the detached restroom idea, but does concur with Mr. Weismann's concern about security. Commissioner Bricker stated the doors and windows are aluminum, and recommended wood frame materials rather than aluminum. Mr. Fearon agreed he will look into wood frame material and consider the suggestion.

Chairman Heidelberg inquired if there were any Public Hearing comments or questions. There were no comments or questions forthcoming and closed the Public Hearing.

Commissioner Nathan Gonzales concurred with Commissioner Bricker on the wood frame material.

MOTION

It was moved by Commissioner Gonzales, and seconded by Commissioner Raumin and carried on a vote of 7-0 that the Historic and Scenic Preservation Commission adopt Resolution No. 2021-15, approving Certificate of Appropriateness No. 638, subject to conditions of approval, and found that the project was exempt from further environmental review pursuant to Section 15331 of the CEQA Guidelines.

2. GUADALUPE COBANOV, APPLICANT (PROJECT PLANNER: LORALEE FARRIS)

PUBLIC HEARING to consider the following applications for the property located at 1605 Calvary Circle in the Administrative Professional (EV/AP) District of the East Valley Corridor Specific Plan (APN: 0293-133-13-0000):

- 1. **Historic Designation No. 135** to nominate and consider a recommendation to the City Council for local designation of a two-story single family dwelling proposed for future adaptive reuse. This application is exempt from the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15061(b)(3) of the CEQA Guidelines, as there is no possibility of any significant effects on the environment.
- 2. Specific Plan No. 40, Amendment No. 47, to amend the East Valley Corridor Specific Plan, Division 4 (Community Design), Chapter 1 (Circulation), Section EV4.0110(b) (Road Standards), Section EV4.0115(a) (Special Landscaped Streets), and Section EV4.0125(2) (Setbacks at

Intersections) to amend the required road right-of-way requirements of a 300 linear foot segment of Alabama Street on the north side of Barton Road (from a width of 120 feet to 110 feet), allow for a 50 foot half-width on the western side and a 60 foot half-width on the eastern side of Alabama Street, and exclude the segment of Alabama Street from the special landscape street and intersection design requirements. This application is exempt from the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15061(b)(3) of the CEQA Guidelines, as there is no possibility of any significant effects on the environment.

- 3. Conditional Use Permit No. 1107 to consider a recommendation to the Planning Commission on a request to rehabilitate and adaptively reuse an existing single family dwelling as a medical office and construct a 1,238 square foot two-story addition (resulting in a total building size of 3,649 square feet) on a 19,970 square foot lot. This application is exempt from the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15301 (Existing Facilities) and Section 15331 (Historical Resource Restoration/Rehabilitation) of the CEQA Guidelines, as there is no possibility of any significant effects on the environment.
- 4. Variance No. 799 to consider a recommendation to the Planning Commission on a request to a reduction in the front yard setback (from 25'0" to 20'2") to allow the encroachment of a ramp to accommodate ADA accessibility, and a recommendation for a reduction to the parking lot setback (from 15 feet to 0 feet) to accommodate the adaptive reuse of the property. This application is exempt from the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15305 (Minor Alterations in Land Use Limitations) of the CEQA Guidelines, as there is no possibility of any significant effects on the environment.
- 5. Historic Parking Modification No. 31 for a recommendation to the Planning Commission and City Council on a request to reduce the landscaping planter width from 5'0" to 3'0", reduce the driveway width from 26'0" to 20'4", allow 4 compact parking stalls, for the adaptive reuse of the structure as a medical office. This application is exempt from the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15305 (Minor Alterations in Land Use Limitations) of the CEQA Guidelines, as there is no possibility of any significant effects on the environment.

Chairman Heidelberg opened the Public Hearing.

Ms. Loralee Farris, Principal Planner, gave an overview and presentation on the proposal and stated that staff, applicant, and the architect are available for questions.

Chair Heidelberg, inquired if there were any questions for staff.

Commissioner Justine Guidry inquired if the project required any subsequent approval on the demolition permit, and if there were any reason it wouldn't be approved since it's less than 50 years.

Ms. Farris stated that it would be a staff level review because it's under 50 years old, and staff does not have any concerns at this time. It would be a condition of approval on their entitlements.

Chair Heidelberg invited the Applicant to come forward.

Mr. Shan McNaughton, Architect, stated this project was formally under review and the original owner decided not to continue with the project. The new owner is very interested on doing a good job with the building. Mr. McNaughton stated that they took the previous comments to heart, and believe they have an even better design now. Mr. McNaughton said he is available for any questions.

Commissioner Bricker complimented the design and appreciated the care that was added to the design of the building.

Commissioner Weissman concurred with Commissioner Bricker.

Mr. McNaughton stated they are preserving the historic granite wall and that the new sidewalk will meander around the wall so that it is incorporated to the overall site plan.

Commissioner Raumin asked if the project would impact KinderCare located next door. Mr. McNaughton stated that there is a wall that separates the property lines. He does not anticipate any conflict, and they are able to provide the required parking on site.

Commissioner Bricker stated that the property originally had 10 acres of citrus and inquired if they considered incorporating any citrus trees in the landscape design. Mr. McNaughton stated that was a great idea and can suggest the recommendation to the landscape architect.

Mr. McNaughton introduced the owners, Ms. Guadalupe Cobanov and Ms. Jennifer Cobanov.

Ms. Guadalupe Cobanov, and Ms. Jennifer Cobanov came forward to address the Commission. Ms. Guadalupe Cobanov stated she believed that it will be a good business for the City of Redlands and the children of need. They would like to do their best to be a good example to the children.

Ms. Jennifer Cobanov stated that the name of her practice is My Pediatric Home and she has been in practice for 11 years as a Pediatrician in Riverside and San Bernardino County.

Chair Heidelberg asked if there were any comments, questions or any further discussion from the Commission. There were no comments or questions forthcoming.

Chairman Heidelberg closed the Public Hearing.

V. NEW BUSINESS

1. REDLANDS RAILWAY DISTRICT, APPLICANT

(PROJECT PLANNER: EMILY ELLIOTT)

PUBLIC HEARING to consider **Certificate of Appropriateness No. 643** develop two commercial retail buildings totaling approximately 6,591 square feet (West Building with 3,053 sq. ft. and East Building with 3,898 sq. ft.) on a 0.68-acre project site located at 347 Orange Street (APN: 0169-281-39-0000), sharing the parcel with Historic Landmark Nos. 38 and 40 (Santa Fe Railway Station and Old Chamber of Commerce Building), at the northwest corner of Third Street and Shoppers Lane, in

the Town Center – Historic (TC-H) District of the Downtown Specific Plan (Specific Plan No. 45). The project qualifies for exemption from environmental review in accordance with Section 15303 (New Construction of Small Structures) of the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines.

Chairman Heidelberg opened the Public Hearing for comments or questions.

Ms. Emily Elliott, Contract Planner, gave an overview and presentation on the proposal and stated that the applicant, and architect are available for questions.

Chairman Heidelberg inquired if there were any questions for staff.

Mr. Glenn Fearon, Redlands Railway District representative, came forward and stated he was available for any questions from the Commission.

Commissioner Nathan Gonzales inquired whether the applicant had considered utilizing architectural elements reflecting the parcel's relationship with the railroad, rather than a packing house theme. Mr. Fearon indicated that they've been working with Architectural Resources Group and wanted to utilize design that references history, while being mindful not to replicate history, and emphasized the walkable plaza areas to promote pedestrian connectivity around the railway.

Commissioner Bricker indicated that she was in favor of the proposed project but indicated reservations regarding the height of the sawtooth roof pattern and its visual impact, given its proximity to the Santa Fe Depot. Mr. Fearon indicated that solar exposure for solar panels was taken into consideration when designing roof angles, but that the applicant would be willing to look into lowering the height of the sawtooth.

Commissioner Steven Holm asked if the roofline would be visible from Orange Street, and if the roofline is shorter than the Depot. Mr. Fearon stated that the Santa Fe Depot is taller than the proposed buildings and would obscure their view from Orange Street and discussed the orientation of the buildings to emphasize a few of the colonnades visible when arriving by train.

Chairman Heidelberg had concerns that the structures may be too abrupt in appearance, from the rail, and concurred with Commissioner Bricker.

Commissioner Gonzales asked Mr. Fearon if it was possible to reduce heights of the sawtooth roof. Chairman Heidelberg inquired if the applicant would be willing to work with staff.

Mr. Stevens, Architect, stated that they would work on reducing the height of the sawtooth roof.

Chairman Heidelberg asked Mr. Stevens if he had wider conceptual drawings with him. Mr. Stevens confirmed, and passed the plans to the Commissioners to review.

Ms. Elliot stated that this item would go to Planning Commission on December 14, 2021 for design review under a separate Commission Review and Approval application.

Commissioner Bricker said that she would like to review the Certificate of Appropriateness application again, after the revisions are made. Ms. Elliott indicated that this would be possible.

Commissioner Justine Guidry inquired if there was a root buffer between the live oak tree roots and the brick work on the hardscaping. Mr. Stevens stated that a root barrier was provided so the roots would not pop the brick pavers up.

Ms. Elliot asked the architect and the architect if they were able to resubmit design drawings for review for the January 6, 2022 HSPC meeting. They both concurred.

Chairman Heidelberg closed the Public Hearing.

It was moved by Commissioner Bricker, and seconded by Commissioner Rose-Marie Raumin that the Historic and Scenic Preservation Commission appoint Commissioner Gonzales as Chair Pro Tem for the duration of the meeting and the motion carried on a vote of 4-0.

I. CALL TO ORDER AND ATTENDANCE

The Commission was in full attendance, with the exception of Chairman Kurt Heidelberg and Vice Chairman Steven Holm who were excused.

The Commission may not discuss or take any action on any public comment made, except that the Commissioners or staff may briefly respond to statements made or questions posed by members of the public)

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales opened the Public Comment Period. There were no public comments forthcoming and the Public Comment Period was closed.

III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

A. December 2, 2021

MOTION

It was moved by Commissioner Bricker and seconded by Commissioner Justine Guidry and carried a vote of 5-0 (Chairman Heidelberg and Vice Chairman Holm absent) to approve the December 2, 2021 HSPC meeting minutes.

IV. OLD BUSINESS

A. REDLANDS RAILWAY DISTRICT, APPLICANT

(PROJECT PLANNER: EMILY ELLIOTT)

CONTINUED PUBLIC HEARING to consider **Certificate of Appropriateness No. 643** – A request to develop two commercial retail buildings totaling approximately 6,591 square feet (West Building with 3,053 sq. ft. and East Building with 3,898 sq. ft.) on a 0.68-acre project site located at 347 Orange Street (APN: 0169-281-39-0000), sharing the parcel with Historic Landmark Nos. 38 and 40 (Santa Fe Railway Station and Old Chamber of Commerce Building), at the northwest corner of Third Street and Shoppers Lane, in the Town Center – Historic (TC-H) District of the Downtown Specific Plan (Specific Plan No. 45). The project qualifies for exemption from environmental review in accordance with Section 15303 (New Construction of Small Structures) of the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines. This item is continued from the December 2, 2021, meeting.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales opened the Public Hearing for comments or questions.

Ms. Emily Elliott, Contract Planner, gave an overview and presentation on the proposal.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales inquired if there were any questions for staff.

Mr. Glenn Fearon, Redlands Railway District representative, came forward and stated he believed the redesign improved the appearance of the buildings. Mr. Stevens, Architect, stated that they took the recommendations given from the Commission seriously, and believed they were successful with the results made to the sawtooth roofline. Mr. Stevens passed around a drawing board to the Commission to review.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales inquired if there were any Public Hearing comments or questions. There were no comments or questions forthcoming and closed the Public Hearing.

Commissioner Bricker commended the project.

MOTION

It was moved by Commissioner Bricker, and seconded by Commissioner Greg Weissman and carried on a vote of 5-0 (Chairman Heidelberg and Vice Chairman Holm absent) that the HSPC adopt Resolution No. 2022-05, finding that the project was exempt from further environmental review pursuant to Sections 15303 of the CEQA Guidelines and approving Certificate of Appropriateness No. 643, subject to conditions of approval.

V. NEW BUSINESS

A. JERROD SMITH. APPLICANT

(PROJECT PLANNER: JOCELYN TORRES)

PUBLIC HEARING to consider **Certificate of Appropriateness No. 639 –** A request to an remove existing asbestos tile roof on an existing single family dwelling and replace the roofing material with gray architectural composition shingles. The property is located at 309 E. Fern Avenue in the R-2 (Multiple Family Residential) District (APN: 0171-381-22-0000) and within the East Fern Avenue Historic and Scenic District. This project is exempt pursuant to Section 15301 (Existing Facilities) of the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales opened the Public Hearing for comments or questions.

Ms. Jocelyn Torres, Assistant Planner, gave an overview and presentation on the proposal.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales inquired if there were any questions for staff.

Commissioner Weissman inquired about the appropriateness of the proposed composition shingle roofing material. Ms. Loralee Farris, Principal Planner, provided an overview of the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of History Properties and outlined the options the Commission had in applying the standards to this application. Ms. Farris advised the Commission to consider whether the existing roof tile, while not original to the dwelling, had gained historic significance in its own right. If so, guidance was given that a replacement material should be similar in the design, color and texture in order to maintain the same general appearance. If not, the Commission may determine whether they feel the composition shingle roofing was an adequate inkind replacement material for the dwelling's original wood shingle roofing material, as restoration of a missing design element.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales asked for staff to expand on the existing and proposed roofing material. Ms. Farris provided details on the roofing materials and outlined staff's recommendations as contained within the staff report.

Mr. Jerrod Smith, Applicant, came forward and shared his preference to replicate the look of the original design of wood shingles through the use of dimensioned composition shingles. Mr. Smith stated that he selected the proposed material as it resembled the look of the original roof by providing similar dimension and shading. Mr. Smith confirmed the wood shingle roofing was still existing on the home but was roofed over with the asbestos tile in the 1930s.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales inquired whether Mr. Smith considered wood shingles for the roof. Mr. Smith said that he did consider wood shingle roofing, but had concerns due to the material's flammability, fire resistance, and availability. Mr. Smith shared a roofing material sample of the proposed material for Commission to review.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales inquired if there were any Public Hearing comments or questions. There were no comments or questions forthcoming and closed the Public Hearing.

Commissioner Bricker commented that she can see the argument on both sides, but was grateful that the Applicant wants to restore the original appearance of the roof. Commissioner Weissman concurred with Commissioner Bricker.

Commissioner Weissman inquired about whether utilizing the proposed material could be considered a historic restoration project. Ms. Farris stated that there are several different categories under the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties, including those for restoration or rehabilitation, each with their own recommendations. Ms. Farris stated that the ultimate goal was to maintain the historic integrity of the structure. Commissioner Weissman stated that with the fires in Southern California, a wood shingle would probably not be the best replacement recommendation in regards to safety. Commissioner Weissman cited an example of another dwelling that utilized composition shingles with a diamond shape pattern and found the pattern to be an attractive option. Commissioner Bricker concurred with Commissioner Weissman.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales suggested that if the consensus can go in either direction, the Commission should lead to the benefit of the property owner. Commissioner Raumin concurred with Chair Pro Tem Gonzales and felt the proposed roofing material would be appropriate, if it replicates the look of the original roofing material.

MOTION

It was moved by Commissioner Weissman, and seconded by Commissioner Raumin and carried on a vote of 5-0 (Chairman Heidelberg and Vice Chairman Holm absent) that the HSPC approve Resolution No. 2022-04, finding that the project is exempt pursuant to Section 15301 (Existing Facilities) of the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines and approving Certificate of Appropriateness No. 639, subject to the conditions of approval.

B. ANTONIUS BRANDON, APPLICANT (PROJECT PLANNER: IVAN FLORES)

PUBLIC HEARING to consider **Demolition No. 361 –** A request to demolish an approximately 750 square foot detached accessory structure over 50 years of age located 36 S. San Mateo Street within the R-S (Residential Suburban) District (APN: 0172-013-57-0000). This project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15301(I) (Existing Facilities) of the CEQA Guidelines.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales opened the Public Hearing for comments or questions.

Ms. Farris, Principal Planner, gave an overview and presentation on the proposal.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales inquired if there were any questions for staff.

Chairman Bricker asked if when evaluating the barn if there was consideration made to the significance of the barn to the property as a whole. Ms. Farris said that the primary dwelling of the property had been surveyed in a previous historic survey, but did not provide reference to the accessory structure.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales inquired whether the structure still included the ramp that was mentioned in the Historic Society evaluation. Ms. Farris stated that it was noted in the Historic Society information, and that it was likely in association to citrus use that occurred on the property, and indicated that the property owner could confirm whether the ramp was still extant.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales inquired if there were any Public Hearing comments or questions. There were no comments or questions forthcoming and closed the Public Hearing.

Commissioner Bricker requested to view the aerial photo and inquired about the function of the other accessory structure on the property. Ms. Farris stated that it is a more recent structure and serves as an accessory dwelling unit.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales inquired if photography was included on the Condition of Approval. Ms. Farris stated this condition was not presently included, but if the Commission would like to add the condition, they could do so. Commissioner Bricker suggested adding the Condition of Approval, not only for recording the history of the site, but also believes it would be helpful for future researchers to see what had been on the property. Ms. Farris stated that the photos are digital photographs. Chair Pro Tem Gonzales said that they could be digital as long as they are created at a high resolution format.

MOTION

It was moved by Commissioner Bricker, and seconded by Commissioner Weissman and carried on a vote of 5-0 (Chairman Heidelberg and Vice Chairman Holm absent) that the HSPC adopt Resolution No. 2022-01, finding the application exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15301(I) (Existing Facilities) of the CEQA Guidelines and approving

Demolition Permit No. 361, based on the facts within the staff report and subject to the Conditions of Approval, this includes the modified Condition of Approval No. 3 as follows:

- 3. Prior to the issuance of any permits the applicant shall submit digital photos of the structure and its surroundings located at 36 San Mateo Street to the Development Services Department and the Heritage Room of the A. K. Smiley Library. The photo shall utilize the cardinal directions to indicate the appropriate elevation.
 - C. TEKIN FAMILY TRUST, APPLICANT (PROJECT PLANNER: IVAN FLORES)

PUBLIC HEARING to consider **Demolition No. 363** – A request to demolish an approximately 1,860 square foot single family dwelling over 50 years of age located 110 Terracina Boulevard within the Agricultural District (A-1) (APN: 0293-141-32-0000). This project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15301(I) (Existing Facilities) of the CEQA Guidelines.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales opened the Public Hearing for comments or guestions.

Ms. Farris, Principal Planner, gave an overview and presentation on the proposal.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales inquired if there were any questions for staff. There were no comments from the Commission or the public, and Chair Pro Tem Gonzales closed the Public Hearing.

MOTION

It was moved by Commissioner Raumin, and seconded by Commissioner Guidry and carried on a vote of 5-0 (Chairman Heidelberg and Vice Chairman Holm absent) that the HSPC adopt Resolution No. 2022-02, to determine that Demolition Permit No. 363 was exempt from review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15301 (Existing Facilities) of the CEQA Guidelines and approved Demolition Permit No. 363, based on the facts within the staff report and subject to the Conditions of Approval.

V. NEW BUSINESS

A. DAVID KELLY, APPLICANT

(PROJECT PLANNER: SEAN REILLY)

PUBLIC HEARING to consider **Certificate of Appropriateness No. 642** – A request for a façade remodel and exterior improvements to an existing building located at 19 North 5th Street (formerly Oscar's Mexican Restaurant). The existing building shares the 5,900 square-foot parcel (APN: 0171-121-10-0000) with Historic Resource No. 33 located at 24 E. State Street. The project qualifies for exemption from environmental review in accordance with Section 15331 (Historical Resource Restoration/Rehabilitation) and Section 15301 (Existing Facilities) of the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines.

Chairman Heidelberg opened the Public Hearing for comments or questions.

Mr. Sean Reilly, Senior Planner, gave an overview and presentation on the proposal.

Chairman Heidelberg inquired if there were any questions for staff.

Vice Chairman Holm inquired if there were any historic photographs that showed the original store front. Mr. Reilly stated that there were no photographs submitted by the applicant.

Mr. David Higginson, Architect, came forward and stated that they are proposing a facade that is unique. Mr. Higginson stated that the owner has a fondness for the Thirteenth Century European architecture and that influenced the proposed design.

Commissioner Raumin inquired on outdoor seating and if it would impede on any of the foot traffic. Mr. Reilly stated that any outdoor seating would be required to obtain separate permits, approvals, and agreements as required and is only shown with the Certificate of Appropriateness application for reference of the applicant's intent. Mr. Reilly said that if it was approved, it would be required to be consistent with Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards. Ms. Loralee Farris, Principal Planner, stated that these details are included within the Conditions of Approval.

Commissioner Greg Weissman inquired about the texture and color of the stucco. Mr. Higginson stated that it's a smooth texture plaster keeping with the European architecture with a monochromatic appearance that the applicants were fond of. He said they added differential color and accents to add a bit of character that keeps with the rest of downtown, yet sets it apart with a clean and simple appearance.

Chairman Heidelberg stated that he was a bit concerned about the treatment on the side of the building and alley with the refinishing of the stucco and paint. He stated that it would break the continuity and appeal with the exposed brick. Chairman Heidelberg inquired if the applicant considered removing the existing stucco on this facade and having it resemble the alley. Mr. Higginson stated that he doesn't believe the owner would be opposed to doing things differently and it would be something they could consider.

Ms. Farris encouraged that if the stucco were to be removed, that the removal first be evaluated

structurally to ensure the stucco could be removed without deteriorating the underlying brick.

Commissioner Weissman asked if there was any earthquake retrofitting that needed to be done to the building. Mr. Higginson stated they are addressing those items in their structural plans and plan to retrofit per code.

Chairman Heidelberg said that he was concerned with the color of the stucco and suggested making it less bright in color. Chairman Heildelberg considered adding a Condition of Approval.

Mr. Reilly stated that a Condition of Approval could be added, but the intent of the condition would need to be clear and the applicant would need to agree with them.

Vice Chairman Holm concurred with Chairman Heidelberg's suggestions.

Commissioner Justine Guidry inquired on the color wrapping around the side of the building to the brick area, and requested clarification. Chairman Heidelberg suggested to create a transition and less contrast. Chairman Heidelberg stated that his original thought was to remove the stucco, but recognized that doing so may jeopardize the structural integrity. Chairman Heidelberg suggested that instead of the bright and contrasting color to the exposed brick and mural, a darker color along the alley way be utilized.

Mr. Higginson believed the suggestions would be acceptable to the owner. Mr. Higginson said that they will try to maintain the brick in the alcove area, and have a darker or accent color option that would transition well from the monochromatic up front.

Chairman Heidelberg recommended adding the Condition of Approval to provide an alternative color scheme and make it less of a bright contrast color.

Chairman Heidelberg closed the Public Hearing.

MOTION

It was moved by Commissioner Holm, and seconded by Commissioner Raumin and carried on a vote of 6-0 (Chairman Bricker absent) that the HSPC approve Resolution No. 2022-06, finding that the project was exempt from further environmental review pursuant to Section 15331 (Historical Resource Restoration/Rehabilitation) and Section 15301 (Existing Facilities) of the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines, and approve Certificate of Appropriateness No. 642, subject to the conditions of approval, this includes the modified Condition of Approval No.7 as follows:

7. The applicant shall work with City staff to provide an alternative color scheme for the alley portion of the building. Prior to the issuance of a building permit, the applicant shall submit darker or accent color options to City staff with color samples with the intent of creating a transition from the eastern elevation of the building to the southern elevation (alley).

B. DIVY HOSPITALITY, INC., APPLICANT (PROJECT PLANNER: JOCELYN TORRES)

An informational presentation for **Commission Review and Approval No. 931** – A request to construct a hotel for Tru Hotel by Hilton with 90 guest rooms and a total of 40,415 square feet, four stories high (50'9" to top of parapet), and related site improvements including parking lot, landscaping, and lighting on two parcels that will be merged into one lot totaling 1.52 acres. The project site is located on the south side of West Colton Avenue at Columbia Street and including 719 N. Eureka Street within the C-4, Highway Commercial District (APNs: 0169-142-07-0000 and 0169-

155-05-0000). The project will require the demolition of an existing single-family residence that is over fifty (50) years of age located at 719 N. Eureka St. (APN: 0169-155-05-0000) which will require future review of a subsequent demolition permit by the Historic and Scenic Preservation Commission.

He also inquired about the type of roof material and whether it would match the home. Mr. Gary Miller, Architect, stated that since the primary historic dwelling has asbestos shingles, the existing accessory structure is not able to match exactly, but clarified that the roofing material of the accessory structure would not be changing from the composition shingle that exists presently, as there are no changes to the roof proposed other than the patio addition. He also said that the driveway is paved not gravel.

Mr. Miller gave an overview of the proposal.

Chairman Heidelberg inquired on the columns for the porch, and asked what they were modeled after. Mr. Miller explained that there were not existing columns on-site to be utilized for inspiration, but that the aim in their design was to present a style that would be compatible with and not detract from the existing architecture of the historic dwelling, but also in its context within the Historic District, which has several Queen Anne Victorian examples. He stated that on the second level they chose slender columns, and on the lower level they chose stone columns to balance things out with the existing home.

Vice Chairman Holm asked if the trees at the entryway to the accessory building were going to remain. Mr. Miller stated that the trees will remain but were not shown on the renderings to provide a clear view of the proposed elevations.

Chairman Heidelberg closed the Public Hearing.

MOTION

It was moved by Commissioner Weissman, and seconded by Vice Chairman Holm and carried on a vote of 4-0 (Commissioner Bricker, Commissioner Guidry and Commissioner Raumin absent) that the HSPC adopt Resolution No. 2022-08, and approve Certificate of Appropriateness No. 646, subject to conditions of approval, and found that the project was exempt from further environmental review pursuant to Sections 15331 and 15301 of the CEQA Guidelines.

V. NEW BUSINESS

A. DIVY HOSPITALITY, INC., APPLICANT

(PROJECT PLANNER: JOCELYN TORRES)

PUBLIC HEARING to consider **Demolition No. 366** – A request to demolish an approximately 692 square foot single-family residence over 50 years of age located at 719 N. Eureka Street within the C-4, Highway Commercial District (APN: 0169-155-05-0000). This project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15301(I) (Existing Facilities) of the CEQA Guidelines.

Chairman Heidelberg opened the Public Hearing.

Ms. Jocelyn Torres, Associate Planner, gave an overview and presentation on the proposal.

Chairman Heidelberg inquired if there were any questions for staff.

Commissioner Greg Weissman asked if the property next to the residence would be part of the development. Ms. Torres stated that it would encompass two parcels that would be merged into one. Commissioner Weissman inquired if the structure on the Northwest corner would also be demolished. Ms. Torres clarified the location of both parcels of the proposal.

Mr. Jayrajsinh K. Parmar, Applicant, came forward to address any questions from the Commission. Chairman Heidelberg asked when the demolition would begin. Mr. Parmar stated that they planned on starting before December.

Mr. Fernando Ramirez, Auto sales property owner, came forward to address the Commission. Mr. Ramirez was in favor on improving a deteriorated area of the corridor from Orange Street down to Eureka Street. He believed the area has a lot of characteristics and potential to be beautiful. Mr. Ramirez also stated that there are homes in the same vicinity that seem to be out of compliance, need repair and should be addressed. In addition, he stated that he supports the hotel project in hopes that it will succeed, improve the area, and protect investments of business owners like himself.

Mr. Shan McNaughton, Architect, came forward to address the Commission regarding the Applicant's request to demolish the single-family residence. He suggested that the small wood framed building could be offered to someone to relocate.

Mr. Pramesh Shaw, Property Owner, called in via Zoom to address the Commission. He stated that he would like to have the house demolished for this project and is in support of the demolition.

Commissioner Bricker concurred with Mr. McNaughton's suggestion. She stated that it seemed to be a well-maintained house from the exterior, has some physical integrity and is a good example of a craftsman house. She stated that she supports the idea of relocating the house to an appropriate location and recommended that a Condition of Approval be added.

Commissioner Weissman asked Mr. Parmar if he had studied the cost and issues of moving the building. Mr. Parmar explained that they bought both parcels, to meet the city's parking requirements for this project and they never considered moving the house to another location. They would rather start the demolition and begin the project as soon as possible. He stated that the interior of the house is not in livable condition and would need a lot of renovation.

Commissioner Guidry inquired about a fire to this home in either 1964 or 1966 and asked if they rebuilt a new house or was it repaired. Ms. Torres stated that there was no additional information after the fire. Chairman Heidelberg asked if anyone lived in the home after the fire. Ms. Torres confirmed the date of the fire being 1966 and stated that in 1967 there was a residence staying at the property according to the research done at A.K. Smiley Public Library.

Chairman Heidelberg suggested that it may be worth making the house available to move off-site and preserve the character of the house. He explained the conditions that are normally placed in these situations and that it may delay the project up to four months. Mr. Parmar asked who would pay for the move. Chairman Heidelberg answered that it would be the responsibility of the party or person moving the house.

Chairman Heidelberg asked Mr. Paramar if he would agree to guidance on how to advertise and give people three (3) months to respond. If there are no respondents, then give another month for any interested person or party to salvage the fixtures and parts from the house that may be

repurposed for other homes. Mr. Paramar agreed with the suggested conditions.

Mr. Brian Foote, Planning Manager, clarified that the entitlement for the hotel was previously approved and at this point it would go through the plan check process. Mr. Paramar stated that they do have the time for the plan check process.

Chairman Heidelberg made a Condition of Approval to add Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) forms to include Primary, Building, Structure and Object (BSO) in order to memorialize what the building looked like. He also requested that a qualified architectural historian record the property and complete the necessary DPR forms so that photographs and comments are provided. Chairman Heidelberg also requested that the Conditions of Approval include a three (3) month advertisement to relocate the home, and if that fails, another month for salvage work. Mr. Paramar agreed with the added condition. Commissioner Bricker added that the resulting documentation be given to the City's Heritage Room at A. K. Smiley Public Library.

Ms. Torres asked the Commissioners for clarification and guidance on how the applicant would advertise the house. Commissioner Heidelberg said that if allowable, they may be able to give resources and believed there is a clearinghouse where you can advertise.

Mr. Paramar asked for an approximate timeframe for the plan check process. Mr. Foote explained that plan checks vary, but a building of that size takes approximately two (2) to four (4) months and that Mr. Paramar can begin the DPR process next week. He added that it also depends on the submittals, corrections, and the consultant's speediness to respond.

Chairman Heidelberg closed the Public Hearing.

MOTION

It was moved by Commissioner Weissman, and seconded by Commissioner Nathan Gonzales and carried on a vote of 6-0 (Vice Chairman Holm absent) that the HSPC adopt Resolution No. 2022-010, and determined that Demolition Permit No. 366 was exempt from environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Section 15301 (Existing Facilities) of the CEQA Guidelines, and approved Demolition Permit No. 366 based on the facts within this staff report and subject to the Conditions of Approval, this includes the added Condition of Approval No. 7 and No. 8 as follows:

- 7. The applicant shall be responsible for obtaining a qualified architectural historian (or other qualified consultant) to prepare and complete the necessary DPR forms (Primary, BSO, and Photo Record) and photographs for documentation of the subject property and structure. The applicant shall provide a copy to the Planning Division and to the City's Heritage Room at A.K. Smiley Public Library.
- 8. The applicant shall offer the house and make the house available to move off-site for ninety (90) days to any interested person or party. The applicant shall provide proof of outreach efforts (e.g., copies of certified letters) to the Planning Division. If after 90 days there has been no interest expressed to the property owner to move the house to another location off-site, then the applicant shall provide an additional thirty (30) days for any interested person or party to salvage parts from the house. Demolition may then occur after the above timeframes and steps have been satisfactorily completed.
 - B. LEONARD AND CAROL INGALLS, APPLICANT (PROJECT PLANNER: JOCELYN TORRES)

PUBLIC HEARING to consider **Demolition No. 368** – A request to demolish an approximately 1,584 square foot detached garage over 50 years of age located at 1376 Pacific Street within the R-E, Residential Estate District (APN: 0175-192-05-0000). This project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15301(I) (Existing Facilities) of the CEQA Guidelines.

Chairman Heidelberg opened the Public Hearing.

Ms. Jocelyn Torres, Associate Planner, gave an overview and presentation on the proposal.

Chairman Heidelberg inquired if there were any comments or questions for staff.

Shaun McNaughton, Architect, came forward to address the commission. Mr. McNaughton stated that the current garage is a very utilitarian structure that doesn't have anything of substantial value or contribution. He stated that it would be replaced with something substantial.

Commissioner Bricker asked the date of construction of the home. Mrs. Carol Ingalls, Applicant, came forward and stated that the home was built in 1989 and the home in the back of the original property is what they hope to renovate.

Chairman Heidelberg closed the Public Hearing.

B. GUADALUPE COBANOV, APPLICANT

(PLANNER: BRIAN FOOTE, CITY PLANNER)

PUBLIC HEARING to consider **Certificate of Appropriateness No. 652** – A request for rehabilitation of an existing single-family dwelling for medical office use, and construct a 1,238 square-foot two-story addition (resulting in a total building size of 3,649 square-feet) on a 19,970 square-foot lot located at 1605 Calvary Circle (APN: 0293-133-13-0000) in the Administrative Professional (EV/AP) District of the East Valley Corridor Specific Plan. Proposed scope of work includes: restore architectural elements and new paint; new wood siding on exterior of 1st floor addition; new cedar shingle on exterior of 2nd floor addition; new window openings and double-hung windows on proposed addition; new asphalt shingle roof and additional roof rafters; new wood columns to match restored columns around porch; and new ramp and ADA-accessibility improvements. The project is exempt from environmental review in accordance with the Section 15301 (Existing Facilities) and Section 15331 (Historical Resource Restoration/ Rehabilitation) of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines.

Chairman Heidelberg opened the Public Hearing.

Mr. Brian Foote, City Planner, gave an overview and presentation on the proposal.

Commissioner Gonzales stated that he believes that categorical exemption under Section 15301 would not be appropriate because it is an eligible historical structure, and that he believed

categorical exemptions cannot be used on an eligible historic structure. He stated that it does qualify under Section 15331.

Commissioner Bricker stated that it is a beautiful project and commended Mr. McNaughton. She inquired about the use of the diamond pane windows, and if he may consider the elimination or alternative to the diamond pattern. Mr. McNaughton answered that the pattern is not necessary on the new windows, and they can make them single light windows and preserve the existing diamond pattern windows, which are a special feature of the home.

Chairman Heidelberg inquired if there were any comments or questions for staff. There were no further comments from the Commission.

Chairman Heidelberg closed the Public Hearing.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales opened the Public Comment Period. There were no public comments forthcoming and the Public Comment Period was closed.

- V. NEW BUSINESS
 - A. JAMES CARRITTE, APPLICANT (PROJECT PLANNER: SEAN REILLY)

PUBLIC HEARING to consider **Certificate of Appropriateness No. 651** – A request to remove an existing 1,484 square-foot open lattice patio cover and construct a new 1,614 square-foot solid patio cover in its place for a single-family residence located at 1165 West Highland Avenue (APN: 0175-091-05-0000) in the West Highland Avenue Historic and Scenic District. This project qualifies for

exemption from environmental review per Section 15301 (Existing Facilities) of the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales opened the Public Hearing.

Mr. Sean Reilly, Principal Planner, gave an overview and presentation on the proposal.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales inquired if there were any questions for staff.

Mr. Brad Robertson, Applicant Representative, came forward to introduce himself and address any questions from the Commission.

Commissioner Greg Weissman asked if the columns in the existing structure would be removed with the new patio cover. Mr. Robertson stated that they are losing two (2) columns on the west side that won't be seen from the front. They are maintaining the west open lattice except for the last portion on the left. Mr. Robertson said that the open lattice looks nice but is not practical. They plan on matching the existing conditions on the front of the house and include the same roof slope, tile, and column.

Commissioner Bricker stated that in comparing site plan A2 with site plan A3 that it seemed that the proposed columns to be removed would be the row of columns across the width of the property. Mr. Robertson concurred and said that the entire lattice structure at the rear of the house would be removed. Commissioner Bricker stated that they appear to be historic and, in her opinion, the loss of a predominance of the columns seems to be a significant alteration to the character of the house. She asked if there was any consideration of keeping the columns, removing the lattice, and replacing it with a new wooden structure or flat roof. She said that she is concerned about the tile roof combined effect being a significant change to an important feature of the house. She encouraged them to rethink the approach and consider the treatment to preserve the character of the house.

Mr. Robertson stated that the columns are not structurally sound. The main goal is for outdoor living and keeping the sun from glaring through to the inside of the house. He said that the flat roof would not work and would have draining issues and would need gutters.

Commissioner Bricker stated that there may be a drainage system to consider. Mr. Robertson stated that the drainage system would be more detrimental to the character of the house. Commissioner Bricker said the columns do not seem to be a replication and seem more of a simple utilitarian support.

Mr. Robertson said that the new columns would be an exact replica of the front of the home with the same scale, stucco, roof material, elevation, and tile to match. The only difference would be the two new braces in the front.

Ms. Debbie Carritte, Applicant, came forward and stated that the wood rot is increasing and there is cracking on the structure and columns. She also believes the columns are a structural hazard because they are elevated on concrete and is a tripping hazard.

Commissioner Bricker stated that if this was consistent with the Secretary of Interior Standards, it should be replaced instead of replicating the front of the home. The Secretary of Interior Standards sets the tone for the city's approach to Historic properties. She stated that this is a significant house, and it is not all about esthetics, it's about significance. She included that there are alternatives that could be used to preserve the character, and what they are proposing does not meet that Secretary of Interior Standards.

Pro Tem Gonzales stated that the visual evidence puts this at more than 50 years of age which would be in the scope of historic. Commissioner Bricker added that it is possible that the lattice was replaced, but the columns seem to be historic which could technically make the lattice historic as well.

Commissioner Justine Guidry inquired if the information discussed along with the photographs and records provided if the structure falls under the timeline of a historic structure. Chair Pro Tem Gonzales concurred.

Commissioner Greg Weissman appreciated Commissioner Bricker's perspective and expertise. He stated that as a commission they are trying to work within the parameters that they are tasked with to protect the historic and scenic homes.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales concurred with the Commissioners and agreed the proposal does not meet the Secretary of Interior Standards. He hoped the applicants would consider alternatives. Mr. James Carritte, Applicant, came forward and stated that the columns are a visual obstruction to the outside of the house and isn't certain that they would be willing to proceed with the project if it was just to add a flat roof.

Commissioner Bricker suggested exploring a simplification of the tile roof and offered to meet with the applicants to discuss a simpler strategy for the roof. Mr. Carritte said that he was interested to meet and view the images to discuss alternate designs.

Mr. Robertson came forward to address his concerns. He said that the flat roof would not work well with drainage and the columns are a trip hazard and are not structurally sound to support a flat roof. The proposal is a hip roof that would match the house. He agreed with the recommendation of keeping the west portion of the columns and requested approval to replicate the existing back patio to match the front of the house. Mr. Robertson asked how he could receive a demolition permit due to the hazard the columns cause.

Commissioner Bricker suggested other options that may be considered and possibly explore another approach using appropriate substitute materials.

Mr. Robertson stated that the Applicant does not wish to continue to consider the options that were suggested by the Commission. The only option they are willing to adhere to is leaving the plans as they are. Ms. Carritte inquired on the procedure to request a demolition due to the hazard. Chair Pro Tem Gonzales recommended working with city staff.

Chair Pro Tem Gonzales closed the Public Hearing.

PUBLIC HEARING to consider **Certificate of Appropriateness No. 661** – A request to replace the existing storefront display windows in Suite 105 with a new roll-up window system, and install a new awning, located at 5 East Citrus Avenue, Suite 105 (APN: 0171-121-04-0000) in the C-3, General Commercial zoning district. The proposal may be subject to environmental review in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines.

Chair Heidelberg opened the Public Hearing. Mr. Foote gave an overview and presentation on Certificate of Appropriateness No. 661. The property is on the local registry as Historic Landmark (HL) No. 57 known as the "Academy of Music Building."

Chair Heidelberg inquired if the property was on the California or National register. Mr. Foote stated he had researched if the subject property was on the National Register, and it was not on the list. It does meet the criteria for the California and National registries.

Mr. Kadir Fakir, applicant/owner, gave a brief overview of his proposal.

Commissioner Bricker stated the challenge is that the unit is isolated and inquired if the applicant had considered large awning windows that pivot.

Both Vice Chair Holm and Commissioner Raumin thought it might be a good compromise.

Mr. Gary Stegeman, architect, came forward to address the Commission and explained the history of the building, the storefronts along Orange Street, and existing constraints such as a seismic beam within the interior of Suite 105 that prevents some possible design alternatives for some types of windows such as single-piece lifting glass panes or vertically pivoting windows.

The Commission, applicant and architect discussed alternatives on the window design. The applicant agreed to explore the window options discussed and to continue their item.

Chair Heidelberg closed the Public Hearing.

Mr. Brad Burchill, applicant, stated the awnings can't handle the weight of Spanish tile or concrete tile and if used the awnings would need to be re-engineered, and insurance would not cover wood shake. Mr. Burchill stated there is a Malarkey brand that makes a lightweight wood shake roof tile if that would be agreeable, and explained the history of the building.

Commissioner Nathan Gonzales stated the applicant could hire a historic architecture consultant to research and prepare a report on the history of the building.

Commissioner Bricker suggested a lightweight metal tile as a possible substitute for heavier type of roofing material.

Mr. Burchill stated he would like to explore the lightweight metal tile material suggestion and come back to the Commission at a later date.

Vice Chair Holm closed the Public Hearing.

It was moved by Commissioner Gonzales, seconded by Commissioner Bricker, and carried on a vote of 4-0 (Chair Heidelberg, Commissioner Weissman, and Commissioner Raumin absent) to continue the item to the November 3, 2022, Historic & Scenic Preservation Commission meeting.

Continued PUBLIC HEARING to consider **Certificate of Appropriateness No. 661** – A request to replace the existing storefront plate glass display windows with new bi-fold windows located at 5 East Citrus Avenue, Suite 105 (APN: 0171-121-04-0000) in the C-3, General Commercial zoning district. The proposal may be exempt from environmental review in accordance with Sections 15301 and 15331 of the CEQA Guidelines.

Vice Chair Holm opened the Public Hearing.

Mr. Foote gave an overview and presentation on the certificate of appropriateness.

Mr. Kadir Fakir, applicant/owner, gave an overview of the proposed windows.

Commissioner Gonzales said he thought the proposed window style was a good solution.

Commissioner Bricker stated the proposed window is a great improvement from the previous proposal.

Vice Chair Holm requested clarification on the seismic beam on the interior of Suite 105 near the front window. Mr. Fakir provided clarification on the obstacles and constraints that the existing beam presented for other potential window alternatives.

Commissioner Bricker recommended painting the exterior trim (mullion) on the windows a darker color such as dark green so the windows would be less apparent visually from the exterior, and stated the proposal was not optimal but is a good compromise. The one horizontal mullion through the middle of the glass (folding seam) should be painted black so that it would appear to almost disappear when the window was closed as viewed from the exterior street-side.

Vice Chair Holm agreed with the darker color on the windows and stated that a darker color would minimize the visual impact when looking at the exterior of the building.

Commissioner Justine Guidry stated she was in favor of the proposal.

Vice Chair Holm closed the Public Hearing.
